



# **Education & Learning Support**

We appropriately select and provide academic information and educational materials which are necessary for the university members.

The library supports the university's educational and research activities as an infrastracture, offering a huge amount of materials and the latest academic information.

## **Research Support Dissemination of Outcomes**

We, as an information hub, provide the best environment for researchers to access the resources, and accumulate and disseminate the intellectual works of the university.

Three Nobel Prize laureates have been associated with the University of Tsukuba. Besides, the university has actively expanded cross-disciplinary research fields, such as 'Cybernics': the fusion of science and technology and medicine, with which HAL® (Hybrid Assistive Limb) has been created. The library contributes to those interdisciplinary research activities with its vast collection.
